DID YOU KNOW?

The equestrian statue of Andrew “Old Hickory” Jackson—the centerpiece of Lafayette Square, across the street from the north face of the White House—was sculpted and cast by Clark Mills and officially dedicated in 1853, on the 38th anniversary of Gen. Jackson’s victory in the Battle of New Orleans.

Mills’s bronze sculpture depicts Jackson tipping his hat while astraddle his rearing warhorse, Sam Patch. It was the first statue of a horse standing on its hind legs and also the first statue sculpted and cast by an American-born citizen.

During the Civil War, soldiers who camped in Lafayette Square laid their clothes to dry on the Jackson sculpture. President Lincoln’s sons, Willie and Tad, climbed the monument and often referred to it as the “tippy-toe statue.”

Jackson’s position against states’ right to secede from the union—“Our Federal Union, It Must Be Preserved”—was added to the statue’s granite pedestal in 1909.
